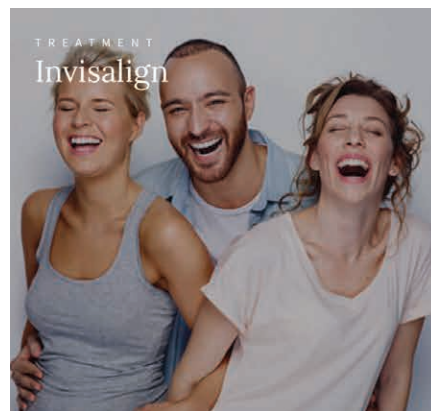

FROM THE MAYOR OF WALKERVILLE cont...

As part of this Australia Day event, St Andrew's School received the Township's *Australia Day Community event of the year* award for their 2018 History Week program. In essence, Australia Day was an opportunity to look to the future and acknowledge the past.

As Mayor, I am also seeking to embrace the future, while still respecting the values and traditions that define us – as individuals, families and communities. Council cannot embrace change without your involvement. The following weeks and months offer several opportunities for people in the Town of Walkerville to provide their feedback on a range of issues.

Nominations are now open for the Volunteer awards. For the first time, we are including a copy of the nomination

form in *About town* to encourage new nominations. The theme for this year's National Volunteer Week is: *Making a world of difference. Consider what a world of difference you could make by nominating an individual volunteer, or an organisation, that has contributed to the wellbeing of our community.*

Walkerville Council, (along with the Cities of Adelaide, Burnside, Campbelltown, Norwood, Payneham & St Peters, Prospect, Tea Tree Gully and Unley); is a partner in the Resilient East project, which looks at the impact of climate change in the eastern region.

Last month, I attended a public event called *Feeling Hot Hot Hot!* presented

by Resilient East and the Adelaide City Council. As well as launching the *Northern and Eastern Collaborative Heat Mapping Project*, (which you can read about on page 3); a panel of experts discussed the environmental, economic, health and social impacts of a hypothetical extended heatwave. The point is – as this Summer has shown us – extended heatwaves aren't hypothetical. Increasingly, they are a fact-of-life that we all need to deal with – and Councils will need to develop ideas and plans to cope with sustained heatwaves, for its residents and its council areas.

Ironically, as *About town* went to print, we had to reschedule an outdoor public meeting for the *Medindie Transport and Parking Strategy* as a result of high temperatures (see page three for more information).

Our urban forest plays a critical role in how we adapt and cope during heatwaves. This brings me to the *Draft Urban Forest Strategy*. In the coming weeks, Council will be seeking your feedback on its *Draft Urban forest strategy*, a document that will guide and shape tree management decisions to protect our shared urban forest. This is an important body of work, and you can read more about it on page four.

Council is already in 2019/20 Annual budget mode. Over the next few months, we will be developing a draft business plan to present to the community for feedback.

As we go to print, our annual *Townwide community satisfaction*

survey is in full swing. This is an important way for Elected Members to gauge the temperature of the community. *What are our priorities? What should Council be investing in? What matters to people?* As well as targeted telephone and social media interviews, the survey is also available online for all residents to submit their feedback.

I hope you enjoy this Autumn issue of *About town*. There is so much to see and do. The Women of Walkerville Foundation is planning two events, our local community groups are as busy as ever and the *Cultivate5081* program offers wellbeing activities and events for all ages.

I would like to mention the ANZAC Day Dawn Ceremony. For those who have never attended this

Ceremony in the Memorial Gardens on Church Terrace, it is truly a moving experience that unites our community.

I hope to see you out and about Town over the coming months.

Nominate today: 2019 Volunteer of the year

Council is inviting our community to shine a light on our local heroes by nominating an individual or local community event for a 2019 Volunteer of the year award.

People can vote (or self-nominate) in these three categories:

Category 1: Volunteer of the year

For exceptional voluntary service by an individual who has benefited the Town of Walkerville. This award is only for people aged over 35 years. This award can recognise a volunteer who has worked in the community for a long-period of time, as well as someone who is new to volunteering, but who has made an outstanding contribution to the Township. The nominee does not need to live in the Township, but must demonstrate a connection to it, through their volunteering activities. Nominations

for individuals who live in the Township but who volunteer outside the Council area will be considered.

Individuals can self-nominate for the Volunteer of the year award.

Category 2: Young volunteer of the year

For exceptional voluntary service by an individual who has benefited the Town of Walkerville. This award is only for people aged 35 years or under.

The nominee does not need to live in the Township, but must demonstrate a connection to it, through their volunteering. This award is also open to students from the Town of Walkerville, who have taken part in volunteering, either in their local school, community, or through other volunteering programs.

Individuals can self-nominate for the Young volunteer of the award.

Category 3: Community event of the year

For a local event held between February 2018 and February 2019, that demonstrated a strong local community focus and volunteering element.

Organisations can nominate their own events for the Community event of the year award.

Definition of volunteering:

Volunteering Australia defines volunteering as an activity where individuals choose willingly to work without an expectation of remuneration to provide a service with community focus.

How Council decides?

Award recipients are selected by the Elected Members of the Town of Walkerville. Their decision is final and no feedback is provided to the nominator. Council also presents a Mayor's choice award which is not open for nomination but is selected by the Elected Members. Winners will be

announced by the Mayor of Walkerville at a Volunteer's presentation event on 22 May 2019.

Feeling the heat

*"Climate change means we'll be having lots more heatwaves – those endless days of unbearable heat that make you want to set up an armchair in your fridge or pitch a tent at the beach. Our cities and towns don't tend to cope with heatwaves very well. All that concrete and bitumen (thermal mass) soak up the heat during the day and then radiate heat back out at night."**

Resilient East is a partnership between State and local Government organisations in Eastern Adelaide – including the Town of Walkerville. Resilient East partners have worked together since 2012, investigating and responding to the impacts of climate change in the eastern region.

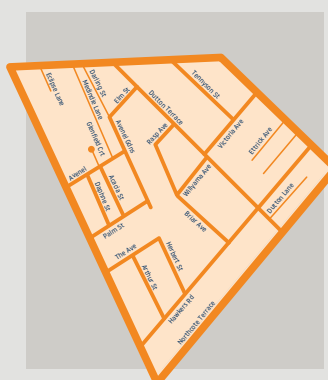
Last month, Resilient East launched their new website which features an amazing heat mapping tool. Data from these heat maps will guide Resilient East Councils in making informed decisions relating to urban planning, tree plantings and the health and wellbeing of the community. Medindie Transport and parking strategy

In May 2018 the Town of Walkerville Movement management Plan was endorsed by the Council. The plan provides an overarching strategy to guide transport networks across Walkerville, Medindie, Gilberton and Vale Park.



In February 2019, Council and GTA Consultants engaged with Medindie residents and stakeholders to ascertain their concerns around transport, traffic, access and parking experiences, within the area bounded by Northcote Terrace, Robe Terrace, Main North Road and Nottage Terrace.

Residents and stakeholders completed an online survey and a drop-in session was held at Hawker Reserve on the 7 March with GTA Consultants and Council's planning and engineering staff. Feedback received during this period will be used to prepare an issues paper that will identify the key areas of concern within Medindie.

Telephone interviews were randomly selected and the survey was also available from the website and promoted through Council's social media and available from a display in the Civic and Community Centre.

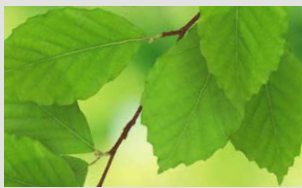

Urban Forest Strategy

Trees on public and private land comprise what is called the urban forest. Cities and towns across the country are working to increase the size of their urban forest to maximise their environmental, economic and wellbeing benefits.

Following a period of public consultation in 2018, Council is now seeking feedback on a draft *Urban forest strategy*.

As well as guiding future tree management across the Township – the strategy itself makes fascinating reading and its findings may surprise you.

Did you know:

- 62% of trees in our urban forest are mature trees and two thirds are expected to survive another 20 years.
- It is estimated that our Town's trees have a replacement value of \$12.3 million.
- Scientific studies show that trees help people lead longer, healthier and happier lives.
- Trees not only provide shade – they also absorb odours and air pollutants.
- Increasing our total canopy cover (on private and public land)

by 20% by 2045 would equate to an increase of 182,712.6m² – which equates to the size of 9.5 Adelaide Ovals!

- Only 8% of public land in the Council area is considered plantable space.

Residential parking permit policy

Since the adoption of the *Residential parking permit policy* in April 2017 Administration has rolled out its 'fixed' and 'transferable' parking permit system, which places a cap on the number of permits available to residents based on the on-site car parking capacity of each allotment. Recently, some minor amendments were added to the policy. These allow for the CEO to exercise some discretion when exceptional circumstances can be demonstrated.

The updated *Residential parking permit policy* is available from Council's website.

Waste not, want not

Reducing food waste can also mean better health outcomes for you and your family – not to mention the planet. Local resident and waste warrior Karen Murphy shares her ideas for reducing food waste.

'I think there is definitely a relationship between healthy eating habits and the amount of waste we produce. For my family, eating lots of fresh fruit and veggies; making most of our own meals and snacks; minimising processed and takeaway foods, and avoiding bottled drinks helps us keep our waste to a minimum', says Karen.

'Shopping as close to the source of the food we eat is something I am committed to. Not only does it support local (and often, small) businesses, it is easier to minimise or avoid pre-packed items by bringing your own bags or containers.'

Karen's waste not, want not tips:

- Start using reusable mesh or compostable bags for all your fruit and vegetable purchases and reduce pre-packaged items whether it is soft

or hard plastic. Polystyrene trays should be avoided altogether as these go straight to landfill.

- Shop at your local butcher and ask for your purchases in compostable bags (you may need to provide your own) or BYO containers. Avoiding pre-packed meat will make a big difference to plastic and smelly landfill waste. A compostable bag goes straight into your kitchen caddy and can also be used to contain any bones or trimmings before going into your organics bin.

- Start buying in bulk. Switch food items that you currently purchase already packaged (e.g. nuts, dried fruit, grains, seeds) to buying in bulk using BYO containers, fabric or paper bags and store in repurposed jars.

- Try to avoid products containing individually packaged items. Where packaging can't be avoided; purchase the greatest amount that you will use before the expiry date, look at a more concentrated version (that will last longer) or try using less.

- Purchase a water filter to eliminate the need for bottled water and flavour sparkling water with natural juices like lemon and lime.

HIDDEN HERITAGE

Vale House, Vale Park

Along the banks of the River Torrens, in the grounds of Levi Caravan Park, lies a truly unique South Australian Colonial treasure.

Vale House is one of the earliest intact Colonial structures in the State and quite likely the oldest and most intact private residence of its kind. Nestled under a magnificent Morton Bay Fig, Vale House has been listed under criterion (g) of *Section 16 (South Australian Heritage Places Act)*.

Built in the early years of the settlement of South Australia, Vale House has been associated with a number of people who have played a part in South Australia's economic and pastoral development. The property was originally owned by Sir John Morphett, one of the founders of the Colony and the house was built for W R S Cooke, an early shipping agent and wholesale dealer.

The most significant owner of Vale House was Philip Levi, a man who was influential in the development of the State's pastoral industry in the mid-nineteenth century. Philip Levi arrived in South Australia in 1838 and quickly became a successful pastoralist, businessman and a founder of the Adelaide Club. He bought Vale House in 1859 and it became the centre of Adelaide's social life, renown for lavish entertainments and gatherings.

Vale House remained in the Levi family until 1950, whereupon it was presented to the Walkerville District.

Today, visitors can experience this local heritage gem by staying in one of the four apartments house in Vale House.

Works about Town

Below is a summary of works about town as well as updates on recently completed projects. Where required, Council communicates directly with residents in affected streets and areas. Lansdowne Terrace road and stormwater upgrade, Vale Park.

This project is scheduled for completion by the end of March/Early April (weather depending). This two-year project comprised two main elements: upgrading the stormwater network to better manage stormwater flows and limit infrastructure damage; and resealing Lansdowne Terrace. The

project also incorporated a number of water sensitive design rain gardens. These locations were informed by feedback from residents and appropriate design conditions.

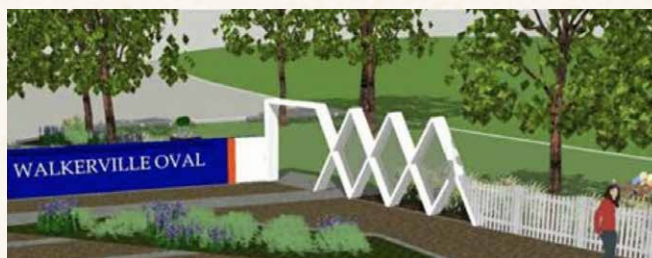

Walkerville Oval entry statement

Nothing evokes the feeling of a 'urban village' more than a white picket fence. White picket fencing and updated signage will be installed at the Smith Street entrance to Walkerville Oval to enhance the visual appeal of the Oval area and to create a welcoming entry statement. Work is expected to commence in early April and Council does not anticipate any disruption to regular users of the Oval or neighbours.

Street tree program

The Town of Walkerville has 25% tree cover – which is equivalent to the size of 48 Adelaide Ovals. Street trees on Council land make up a significant portion of our canopy cover and Council's Street tree program ensures that the health of these trees is maintained in a systematic manner.

The program commences in the cooler months and focusses on two suburbs a year. The condition of every tree is assessed and responded to. Urgent works outside the scope of the program are prioritised as required.

Garden bed renewal

Council's beautification team maintains approximately 70 garden beds which includes roundabouts, median islands and garden beds located within reserves. In addition to ongoing routine maintenance specific areas are selected for rejuvenation or renewal. This work is typically undertaken in the cooler months and includes repairs, upgrades to existing irrigation and the planting of new vegetation and trees.

Gilberton Boardwalk

Contractors completed the installation of a handrail and installed a non-slip surface on the wooden boards to be reduce the

risk of slipping during the winter months.

Hamilton Reserve/Levi Oval

The existing irrigation system for both sites is reaching the end of its useful life. Council is currently seeking quotes to upgrade the irrigation for both these open spaces. Works will commence in the cooler months. Council will look to undertake works in such a way that minimises the impact to user groups and the wider community.

Heritage stone wall, Wesleyan Cemetery

Work on restoring the heritage stone wall at this historic site has been completed (see below).
