

FROM THE MAYOR OF WALKERVILLE

I have been reflecting on my message to you from this time last year in the 2021 autumn edition of About Town.

I have realised that, not much has changed. Sadly, COVID-19 remains just as prevalent and the community is still living with the challenges that we faced 12 months ago.

We continue to live in a world with constant change, confusion and the inevitability of restrictions, paired with the inability to plan too far into the future. This time last year, it was rare to know anyone who had contracted COVID-19 – you would hear of the "friend of a friend of a friend" who was impacted. Whereas now, we could all name a family member, colleague or loved one who's had the virus themselves.

At the end of the day, life is about how you look at it and the small wins along the way whether that is watching your children play in the newly completed Hamilton Reserve nature play area, celebrating a sociallydistanced birthday in Mary P Harris Reserve or enjoying a coffee at one of our excellent businesses on a nice sunny day.

Wayne Dyer once said: "Change the way you look at things and the things you look at change". Whilst it may seem cliché, I think we could all try to do this a little more in 2022. When you change the way you see the world, your intentions start to shift in that same direction. Maybe that involves reflecting on lessons from the past.

I recently read a post online that struck a chord with me and I wish to share it with you in the hope that it helps to put things in perspective:

Imagine being born in 1900.

When you are 14 years old, World War I begins. It ends when you are 18, with 22 million dead.

Shortly after, a world pandemic, the Spanish flu appears, killing 50 million people. You are alive and 20 years old.

Then at the age of 29, you survive the global economic crisis that started with the collapse of the New York Stock Exchange, causing inflation, unemployment and hunger.

When you are 33 years old, the Nazis come to power.

You are 39 when World War II begins and it ends when you are 45 during the Holocaust when 6 million Jews die. There is a total of more than 60 million dead.

When you are 52, the Korean War begins.

When you are 64, the Vietnam War begins and ends when you are 75.

A child born in 1985 thinks his grandparents have no idea how difficult life is, but they have survived several wars and catastrophes.

A child born in 1995 believes that it is the end of the world when an Amazon package takes more than three days to arrive or if they don't exceed 15 likes for an Instagram photo.

In 2022, many of us live in comfort, have access to various sources of entertainment at home and often have more than needed.

We have electricity, phones, food, hot water and a roof over our heads.

People were not as fortunate in the 1900s. But humanity survived much more serious circumstances and never lost the joy of life.

We should be thankful that we are alive.



As we reflect on the past to give us some perspective, it is also important to look to the future in order to remain focused on what lies ahead.

As we look forward, it is the last year of this Elected Body, with Local Government elections taking place in November. I think I can speak for all my fellow Councillors, when I say that I am excited about seeing our vision for the Township come to further fruition by the end of this year with the start of construction on the Walkerville Oval community hub building, the transformation of Alfred Street into a greener gateway connecting Walkerville Terrace to the oval precinct and the redevelopment of the eastern end of Levi Park with a new ship-themed playground space.

While these projects have been accounted for, we are now turning our minds to funding new projects as part of the 2022/23 financial year. As we enter into the budget season, the Elected Members of this Council are engaged in developing the draft Annual Business Plan. It is a vital part of the year for any Council and I encourage you to have your say once we start our consultation process.

I look forward to updating you on these projects in our next edition of About Town.


The secret of Hamilton

As you wander through the arch gateway, past the timber nature play logs and towards the lush green grass labyrinth – you may stumble across a hidden piece of Hamilton Reserve.

During Council's planning for the upgraded park, the team put on their creative caps and designed a secret code to be unravelled by the community. Both children and adults have managed to master the encrypted message, locating each icon and deciphering the clues that lay around the Vale Park reserve.

The code is designed to be hidden, so we shall say no more and leave the rest to you.

Tip: remember to take a notepad and pen to solve the mystery that lies hidden within the park.



Hamilton Reserve (formally known as Stewart Avenue Park), on the corner of Mimosa Drive and Stewart Avenue, was previously a barren area off the Linear Park Trail that Council saw the opportunity to transform into a useable piece of recreational open space.

From a children's bike track loop and nature play equipment, to undercover barbecue areas and range of plants – the park now acts as a place for the community to meet, play and enjoy.

Council acknowledges the Government of South Australia for its contribution of \$319,825 towards the project as part of the 2020/21 Open Space and Places for People Grant Program.





Loo completes the look

To cap off the successful Hamilton Reserve upgrade, a new toilet block was installed and opened to the public in January 2022. This is Council's second Exeloo toilet in recent months, following on from the Willow Bend Reserve installation at the end of 2021.

This new Exeloo provides great serviceability to River Torrens commuters and reserve patrons alike, in a prime location along the Linear Park Trail.

The self-cleaning, disability-friendly toilet block is open during daylight hours and auto locks each night.



Alfred Street: a greener gateway

The plan to transform Alfred Street into a green "avenue" connecting Walkerville Terrace to the oval precinct will be running full steam ahead, following confirmation of a successful funding application of \$131,087 as part of the Greener Neighbourhoods Grants Program.

Council is working with local residents and businesses to finalise the design, with construction expected to begin in May 2022.

The Alfred Street upgrade will provide a significant facelift to a key activity zone of Walkerville. The project aims to create a more inviting streetscape with roadside trees and plantings, improved ease of vehicle movement and a safer environment for pedestrians.

The plans include:

• Transforming Alfred Street into a one-way

avenue (entrance from Walkerville Terrace and exit via Warwick Street) to assist with parking and vehicle access;

- Creating a shared use promenade link between Walkerville Terrace and Walkerville Oval to provide safer pedestrian linkages;
- Increasing landscaping and tree planting to provide a corridor with surrounding streets;
- Upgrading surfaces to permeable pavement for stormwater management.

Detailed designs are subject to Council approval, which was expected to take place at *About Town* presstime.

Further details on construction timeframes will be provided through Council's website and Weekly Round Up newsletter.

Walkerville Oval redevelopment

From children learning to play sport and the north-east's upcoming athletes, to craft groups and corporate meetings – the redevelopment of Walkerville Oval will not only be a state-of-the-art facility, but a place that will become the heart of Walkerville.

The vision for the site will start to become a reality in May 2022, when Council will break ground, making way for the new sports and community hub.

Council is assisting local clubs find alternative homes during the construction phase of the project. This process is currently taking place, with the existing buildings to be vacated and unavailable to the public from April 2022.

Throughout the past few months, the Walkerville Oval Redevelopment Committee has been reviewing and workshopping the building design, following various meetings with stakeholders and architects, Walter Brooke.

The Committee has also endorsed a Master Plan for the site, which can be viewed on Council's website.

Council acknowledges the State Government for its contribution of \$4 million as part of the Local Government Infrastructure Partnership Program.

Can Town of Walkerville come out on top spot for waste diversion?

Council is setting a challenge for our residents – can we get to the number one place for diverting resources from landfill by recycling and composting more?

The diversion rate is the amount of resources that are recycled through the yellow bin or composted through the green, rather than being sent to landfill.

With a total diversion rate of 59%, the Town of Walkerville has the second highest diversion rate out of East Waste's seven member Council areas. However, 41% is still ending up in the blue landfill bins, meaning there is certainly room for improvement.

Our recent bin materials audit showed that 41.6% of materials disposed of in the blue landfill bin was food and compostable material.

Council could save \$76,000 per year if all food and compostable materials were placed in the green bin, rather than the blue landfill bin.

How can we do better?

The MOST IMPORTANT item to be placing in our green bins is unwanted food and compostable items - such as paper towel, tissues, compostable cardboard and paper food packaging and shredded paper.

Overall, only 14% of all the food organics found was captured in the green bin.

This means that most of the food organics (86%) were wasted in landfill bins or found contaminating the yellow comingled recycling bin.

Most of the greenhouse gas emissions from landfill come from decomposing organic material, which could be composted through the green bin. Not only do green organics produce methane as they decompose, but their nutrients remain locked in landfill and cannot be used again to grow plants and food.

To help reach our goal, why not visit Council and get your free kitchen caddy today? The kitchen caddy system is where you can dispose of food scraps and other compostable materials before placing them into your green lidded food and garden organics bin.



Calling all green thumbs

Walkerville Council maintains a large area of land in Torrens Linear Park. Its resources limit what it can do, and for much of the area, maintenance is restricted to grass cutting and weed control.

Like many others, I am concerned about the loss of native vegetation on the Adelaide Plain and the associated loss of native insects, animals and bird life. In 2019, I saw this as an opportunity regarding a section of the park near our home in Lansdowne Terrace. I could express my concern in a practical way!

I approached Council for permission to plant Adelaide Plains native plants along the walking trail in the park. This was readily granted and I have since received two grants to purchase seedlings, as well as many loads of mulch from Council.

The initial planting was very successful – many of the plants grew quickly, making a noticeable local impact. I have since extended the area planted and increased the range of plant species. This has given me a lot of enjoyment and satisfaction, and pleasure to appreciative passers-by!


