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## Ascot Avenue streetscape taking shape

### Plants and trees have arrived at Vale Park!

This week marked the commencement of planting works for the new streetscape along Ascot Avenue, Vale Park.

Located at the busy intersection of Ascot Avenue and Harris Road, this new streetscape includes more than 350 new plants, a new irrigation system, footpath upgrades and landscaping to provide a greener gateway into the Township.



It also completes the Ascot Avenue mural project from 2022, which involved the painting of a 100-metre nature mural, inspired by the students of Vale Park Primary School.

Landscaping works are due for completion by mid July.

# Draft 2023/24 Annual Business Plan consultation finishes today!

Council's Draft 2023/24 Annual Business Plan has been developed to deliver services, facilities and programs that support our community and businesses over the next financial year.

As part of the planning process, the Town of Walkerville community is invited to provide feedback on the draft plan for 2023/24.

The Draft 2023/24 Annual Business Plan will be funded by a proposed average residential rate increase of 6.9% (excluding growth), which is below the rate of inflation over the past 12 months and at the lower end of the projected rate rises in Councils across South Australia.



This Annual Business Plan will continue Council's excellent maintenance of parks and gardens, progress our road and footpath renewal program, create new event and activity opportunities with the Township, and continue public consultation on important projects, policies, and initiatives.

At a Special Council Meeting on Monday, 5 June 2023, Elected Members endorsed the Draft Annual Business Plan for consultation. The full Council report can be viewed on the <u>Council website</u>.

## Let's reminisce: William Ricketts' statue

Within the safety of the Theresa Walker Gallery stands a William Ricketts statue, surrounded by the Council's collection of Mary P Harris artworks.

How did we come to have this statue when William (Bill) Rickett lived and worked in Victoria?

His sanctuary at Mount Dandenong was well-known for his clay statues of Aboriginal people, which were set amongst the trees and shrubs.

Bill was a close friend of local artist and icon, Mary P Harris, who lived in Walkerville, and whenever he was travelling through Adelaide, he would visit her.

Mary had been quietly campaigning for some time for the beautification of Howie Reserve, which separated her home, Bundilla, from the River Torrens. She managed to persuade Bill to donate a major work for placement in the Reserve, with enthusiastic support from the Council.

It was indeed a major work, depicting the almost life-sized upper torso of a male Aboriginal Elder, as well as the heads of children and possums mounted the form into to give the impression of the adult overseeing the future.

Bill called it, "PMARANUKA: My Country".

The official unveiling of the work took place on 31 March 1970, with the Mayor of Walkerville, E.C. Scales, conducting what was reported as "a short ceremony".

It was a dream come true for Mary, as it was her wish that Bundilla be preserved intact as a permanent sanctuary after her death.

The addition of Bill's work to Howie Reserve complemented the works already within the grounds of Bundilla, bolstering Mary's hopes that Bundilla and the Reserve would become one.

Sadly, the statue became another example of the futility of placing Bill's clay works in public. It survived intact until late 1984 or early 1985, when vandals took to the head and shoulder of the Elder with a blunt object, smashing it to pieces.

The remains were gathered and transferred to the Council works depot. Council contracted ARTLAB Australia in July 1992 to conserve the work.

Although large sections of the face, the left shoulder, shoulder blade and the lower back were missing – Amber Row, objects conservator, took up the challenge and spent approximately 59 hours on the conservation.

Ms Rowe successfully located the 27 surviving pieces and incorporated them into a special Araldite resin. The completed process, while not attempting to disguise the repairs, regained "PMARANUKA'S" former glory.

In late 1992, it was again unveiled to the people of Walkerville to reside safely inside the Theresa Walker Gallery – where the statue currently lives.

This throwback is part of the Town of Walkerville's monthly history series, touching on iconic and famous moments, people and places in Walkerville history.

The iniatitive was part of a funding program from Wellbeing SA, activated by Libraries SA, to encourage health and wellbeing through activities like walking.





## Walkerville Oval – redevelopment update

Elected Members wish to assure the community that they remain committed to completing the Walkerville Oval project – whether in its current design, a revised design or a refurbished design.



Council considered the next steps for the Walkerville Oval redevelopment at a Special Meeting of Council on 26 June 2023, where they decided to investigate future possibilities to ensure the project would proceed.

Elected Members agreed upon their dedication to completing the redevelopment – but acknowledged the need to consider other potential options in light of large cost blowouts since the original estimated project cost.

The currently approved knockdown rebuild plan for the Walkerville Sports Club and Walkerville Bowling Club was estimated at \$8 million (which included a \$4 million grant from the State Government). The project cost is now expected to be in the vicinity of \$15 million.





Mayor Melissa Jones confirmed Council was determined to progress the project to ensure the buildings and associated facilities were upgraded to meet the needs of the growing community.

"Whilst it is disappointing that the oval project is delayed, Council is steadfast in its commitment to delivering a redevelopment that improves the site from its current standards to meet the needs of the community," Mayor Jones said.

"However, as a result of the recent and significant increases to the original project budget – which has nearly doubled due to the current global economic environment and heightened inflation costings – we need to be very cautious of increased costs.

"Council is being diligent in its planning and we need to look at exactly how we move forward to ensure we are providing a relevant redevelopment that is in the scope of our budget and borrowing capacity."

At the Special Council Meeting, Elected Members decided to defer any further action on the Walkerville Oval redevelopment so that the incoming Chief Executive Officer could undertake a review into the options – which may include a potential refurbishment or redesign of the sports and bowling clubs – and report back to the Chamber by Thursday, 30 November 2023.






## **Come along to the Propel SA Business Breakfast**
