## National Walk Safely to School Day

Primary school aged children across Australia will make those important steps towards a healthier future by participating in National Walk Safely to School Day on Friday 19 May 2023.

This May will mark the 24th anniversary of National Walk Safely to School Day.

Championed by the Pedestrian Council Australia, the initiative aims to raise awareness of the health, road safety, transport and environmental benefits that regular walking, or alternative active transport (especially to and from school), can provide for the longterm wellbeing of our children.

Apart from the physical benefits, regular walking (or similar) also has a favourable impact on children's cognitive and academic performance.


Walk Safely to School Day encourages positive environmental action. better use of public transport with reduced car-dependency encourages parents and carers to walk more, dangerous reducing traffic congestion around schools.

The national initiative also promotes healthy eating and encourages to schools host healthy breakfast on the day.



#### **Domestic Violence Awareness Month**

This month is an opportunity to raise awareness of the ongoing domestic violence epidemic in Australia.



Domestic violence does not discriminate, affecting people of all ages, races, beliefs, backgrounds and social positions. Town of Walkerville aims to stand up, speak out and act to prevent violence against women.

As part of Council's White Ribbon commitment, it has partnered with the Domestic Violence (DV) Safe Program as a collection point for old (working) mobile phones. The mobile phone is often one of the first items to be thrown, broken or stolen during domestic violence, leaving the victim cut off from the outside world, with no way to call emergency services or helplines for assistance. The DV Safe Program:

- Encourages the community to donate unwanted phones and repurposes them for those vulnerable members who need a "safe" phone in times of emergency.
- Handles the security requirements around the disposal of old mobile devices (they individually factory reset and test every phone, as well as destroying any removable SD cards).
- Meets the environmental requirements around disposal of old mobile devices (if the phone is unusable due to age/damage, it is recycled through an official mobile phone recycling centre).

#### Weekly waste tip

#### Did you know all your food scraps can go in the green bin? But make sure to hold the packaging!

All food scraps, including citrus, onion, dairy, meat, bones, fish, fruit and vegetables, need to be recycled through your green bin (unless you have a home composting system set up).

Be sure to remove all packaging first (unless it's compostable). That includes things like plastic packets, bags and containers, and glass jars.

When you put food scraps into your green bin, they're taken to a commercial composting facility to be processed and made into valuable compost, soil and mulch products, which are then used on South Australian farms and vineyards, and in household gardens as well.

#### Watch out for dangerous mushrooms!

SA Health and the Department for Environment is warning South Australians to be careful this wild mushroom season as Death Cap mushrooms (Amanita phalloides) have been found in Adelaide.

The dangerous mushrooms were identified in easily accessible public spaces in the Adelaide Hills, including areas around the Mt Lofty botanic gardens.

Poisonous wild mushrooms often grow after heavy rains in late summer to early winter - these mushrooms can make a person very ill and have life-threatening consequences.





## By-law No.6 - Consultation closes soon

Town of Walkerville By-laws are established to ensure that Council can respond to issues within the local area and assist us in protecting the convenience, comfort and safety of our community.

Following a mandatory review, Council endorsed its revised By-laws on 17 October 2022, those By-laws being:

- Permits and Penalties By-law No. 1;
- Local Government Land By-law No. 2;
- Roads By-law No. 3;
- Moveable Signs By-law No. 4; and
- Dogs By-law No. 5.





The draft Council by-laws is open for consultation from 9am on Tuesday 18 April 2023 and closes at 5pm on Tuesday 9 May 2023.

Each year, the Town of Walkerville repairs and replaces footpaths across the Township as part of our Capital Renewal Program.


The year the following paths have been nominated:

- Smith Street Church Terrace to 39 Smith Street, Walkerville (South-West side)
- Warwick Street Walkerville Terrace to The Watson carpark, Walkerville (South-West side)
- Stewart Avenue Mimosa Drive to Stewart Avenue intersection, Vale Park (North side)
- Cambridge Walk laneway Cambridge Street to Harris Road, Vale Park
- Redford Street Fife Street to Ilford Street, Vale Park (both sides, patching)
- Wilpena Avenue Fife Street to Ilford Street, Vale Park (both sides, patching)

Preliminary work started on Thursday 27 April 2023 and major works started this week, continuing until the middle of May.

# River Torrens Linear Park Shared Path Enhancement: Stage 2

#### Staged path section closures.

The River Torrens Linear Park Path is being enhanced to provide a safer and more enjoyable experience for recreational users.

Works on Stage 1 will continue until late May 2023.

#### The project includes:

- Reconstruction of the shared path along the River Torrens Linear Park between the intersection of Battams Road / Ninth Avenue, Royston Park, to the east and St Peters River Park to the west;
- A new 2.5 kilometre, 3.0-3.5 metre wide shared path;
- Wayfinding and signage to improve the ability for people to find their way to key destinations; and
- LED lighting that is fully compliant with Austroads Guidelines and Australian Standards.

During construction, sections of the path will be closed and suitable diversions will be provided for pedestrians and cyclists.

The first stage (Stage 1) of the project will commence at Harrow Road and progress towards Player Avenue.


During this first stage of the project, a full detour of the path will be required which includes closure of the Gilberton Swing Bridge.

## Let's reminisce: Walkerville's first policeman

Constable Stephen Wellington became Town of Walkerville's first policeman when he was appointed to the area in about 1894.

Town of Walkerville Council had been concerned by acts of vandalism about the Town and appealed to the Chief Secretary for police protection, resulting in Constable Wellington's appointment.

At this time, George Brookman was a councillor for the Gilberton Ward at Council and had himself experienced a break-in at Ivanhoe, Edwin Terrace. Constable Wellington was stationed conveniently nearby at 14 Edwin Terrace, where he also had his office in the basement.

During his time in the Walkerville district, he dealt with fatalities and drownings, found the Walkers Arms open after hours on a Sunday, charged a person with loitering near Park Terrace, investigated a bag of money (the takings of a city office) which was snatched from a woman in Warwick Street, and a man found hanging in the Walkerville brewery.

On two occasions he captured escaped convicts. The first escapee was captured in St Andrew's Church at 1am – he was serving a sentence of six years for breaking into George Hawker's residence in Medindie in 1893.

The second escapee was serving a three-month term for being a 'rogue and vagabond' and was captured by Wellington at the other end of Walkerville.

Other matters he dealt with included a man who 'lewdly and obscenely exposed himself to two girls in a Walkerville tramcar', and an intoxicated resident charged with riotous behaviour and indecent language disturbing a Salvation Army meeting.

Wellington was also recorded assisting a fellow who had been assaulted, knocked down and repeatedly kicked on the body and face outside the old Sussex Arms by two drinking companions and dragged to the bank of the Torrens.

All this policing in a period between 1894 and 1902. Wellington remained as the local constable until 1902 when plans were already advanced for a police station and residence to be built next to the Walkerville Hall and Municipal Office.

Constable Wellington never married and died in 1927, aged about 74.
