The children were able to eat their creations at the end and also walk away with the knowledge of how to recreate the recipe at home!














# Road resealing work around the Township

the local roads to preserve the life of the road, alongside traditional asphalt treatments on some of the larger roads.


This year's program of works included:

Have your Christmas lights lost their sparkle? Don't throw them out just vet!



# Christmas lights lost their sparkle?

Now that Christmas is over and it's time to take down the lights and decorations, you may have found that some lights are no longer working.

Before you throw them out, here's a few steps to take before you throw them out – you might save them from going into landfill!

- Replace the batteries If they are solar powered, you will need solar/lithium rechargeable batteries, which are available from most hardware or battery stores. If you are replacing the batteries, please recycle your old batteries at ALDI, IKEA, the Town of Walkerville front foyer and at Officeworks stores;
- Check and replace any broken fuses or globes There are easy to follow online tutorials on how to do this if you are not sure. Your local hardware or lighting store should have the supplies you may need. If you are not able to do this yourself, take them to a local repair café or ask a handy friend with electrical experience to help; and
- If they cannot be repaired They can be recycled by taking them to any of the Unplug N' Drop electronic recycling locations listed here. Please tie the lights up or place them in a bag first so they don't tangle around the other electronic items when you drop them off.

It is important that you do not place old Christmas lights in your yellow recycle bin as they will tangle around machinery and may cause it to break down at the Materials Recycling Facility.


# 2024 South Australian Volunteer Awards nominations open Monday

The 2024 South Australian Volunteer Awards will be open to nominations from Monday, 15 January 2024 until Sunday, 10 March 2024.

These awards recognise the invaluable work that volunteers, volunteer managers, community organisations and businesses the South Australian contribute to community.

There are five nomination categories:

- The Joy Noble Medal South Australia's highest distinction for an individual volunteer and is open to all individual volunteers across the State;
- 'The Andamooka' Community Project Award – awarded to a community, or
  - group of volunteers, that has undertaken a community project resulting in significant community benefit;



- The Premier's Award for Corporate Social Responsibility recognises the strong contribution the business sector makes to our communities through philanthropy, partnerships or releasing employees for volunteer service; and
- The Young Volunteer Award introduced for the first time in 2023, this award celebrates the achievements and contributions made by a young volunteer aged 12-25 years old.

Any member of the public can nominate eligible recipients for these awards and selfnominations are accepted. The award guidelines and the online nomination form will be available from Monday, 15 January 2024 on the Volunteering SA & NT website.
