Let's reminisce: Local bank robbers guilty conscience

In 1889, George Jenner moved into a Burlington residence on Street. Walkerville, with his son, Thomas **Edward Jenner.**

The young Mr Thomas Jenner was a cashier and teller at the Hindmarsh branch of the National Bank for upwards of seven years.

On Thursday, 17 October 1889, the teller at the Hindmarsh branch of the National Bank failed to make an appearance, which aroused suspicion in the mind of the branch manager, Mr F.G. Smith.



Following an inspection, it proved that a robbery had taken plan. Communication was immediately sent to the head office in town and two accountants were sent to the branch to assist Mr Smith in assessing the true state of the case.

It was found that over £410 was short in the teller's cash – which was considered a very large sum in those days, estimated to be equal to \$40,000 today.

The missing clerk, Mr Thomas Jenner, had been residing with his father in Walkerville, but had been spotted at the Adelaide Railway Station. It was thought he had left the city by the Melbourne Express.

On the following Monday after the bank robbery, Mr Smith wrote to head office saying that, "No trace whatever appears to be obtainable in regard to this delinquent, for although the detectives believe he went to Melbourne, there is no actual proof".

A SOUTH AUSTRALIAN BANK DEFAULTER.

THE CULPRIT ARRESTED IN LONDON,

LONDON, MAY 28.

Thomas Edward Jenner, late cashier st the Hindmarsh branch of the National Bank of Australasia, has given himself up to the London police, and has admitted that he embezzled £400 belonging to the bank.

He was brought before a police rangistrate to-day and remanded.

|Our Adelaide correspondent telegraphs : With reference to the cablegram announcing the arrest of Thomas Edward Jenner, the Himilmarch National Bank defaulter, who left the colony in October last, on October 17 Jenner tailed to put in an appearance at the Suspicion was at once aroused, and an investigation proved that a robbery had taken place. After a careful search it was found that over £410 was short in his cash, A warrant was issued for the arrest of Jenner, charging him with emberzhing £395 belonging to the bank. Jenner had residing at Walkerville relatives, and his triends were anxiously inquiring after him on the day he was missing. As he had not been home the night before, and could not be found, it was thought that he had made for one of the neighbouring colonies. Jenner was seen at the Adelaide railway atation on October 16, and was stated to have booked for Melbourne. It is probable that a detective will be despatched to England with an extradition warrant to bring Jenner back to South Australia.

"The modes of escape from Melbourne are now so frequent that he may have escaped altogether – not having a photograph of him intensifies the difficulty of tracing him."

The bank very well believed that Thomas would get away with his thievery, however, he later handed himself into police in London on 27 May 1890, to the Seething-lane Police Station.

In *The Evening Journal* on Thursday, 3 July 1890, the paper stated that Thomas had "given himself into custody of his own free will, and in order to free his mind".

Thomas was searched by the police and was found to be without the money, having spent the whole of the £400 he stole from the bank.

Thomas was charged on his own confessions at the Bow-street Police Court on 27 May 1890, with embezzling £395 from the National Bank of Australasia.

This throwback is part of the Town of Walkerville's monthly history series, touching on iconic and famous moments, people and places in Walkerville history. The history of this robbery was researched and collected with assistance from local historian, Lyn O'Grady.

Jenner at Bow-street

A young man, giving the name of Thomas Edward Jenner, was charged on his own confession, at the Bow-street Police Court, on May 27 (says the European Mail) with embezzling £395 10s., belonging to his employers, the National Bank of Australais, Hindmarsh Branch, South Australia. Detective Inspector Marshall, of the A Division, stated that the prisoner surrendered himself at Seething-lane Police Station. Information had already been conveyed to the police that he had absconded, and a reward of £250 was offered for his arrest and the recovery of the money, and £100 for his arrest only. The prisoner volunteered the statement that he was twenty-five years of age, and had been employed in the Bank for upwards of seven years as cashier and teller. He had absconded on October 16, 1889, with the amount mentioned, and had given himself into custody of his own free will, and in order to free his mind. Replying to Mr. Vaughau, Inspector Marshall said that the authorities had received communications from the Australian police. The munications from the Australian police. accused was remanded.

Last chance to have your say on the Walkerville Oval amenity development consultation

The Town of Walkerville has developed concept plans for sports and infrastructure improvements within the Walkerville Oval precinct, which is currently out for public consultation.

The proposed changes seek to bring the existing sporting infrastructure at the Oval up to modern design, compliance and safety standards, whilst also improving pedestrian connectivity and amenity through the precinct.

The recommended changes have come about as a result of Town of Walkerville's long-standing commitment to improving the facilities at Walkerville Oval as part of its



Major Projects strategy. The proposed scope of works would include the following:

- New Walkerville Oval lighting & electrical infrastructure;
- New multi-sport community court area with lighting (featuring line marking and matchcompliant runoff for netball, basketball and tennis. Under plans, the current two tennis courts would be reduced to one tennis court to allow for line marking);
- New cricket practice nets (featuring six synthetic pitches for public use and two turf pitches to be used and maintained by the Walkerville Cricket Club);
- New 10m x 4m shelter with two picnic tables/seating and new barbecue, with an accessible path linking through to Alfred Street; and
- New public toilet (Exeloo).

The benefits of the above proposal include the improvement of night-time sporting standards, the introduction of community basketball within the oval precinct and much more`.

Consultation on draft Code of Practice

Council has reviewed its current Code of Practice – Access to Council Meetings and Documents (Code of Practice), which is soon to close to community feedback.

The updated Code allows for Council Members to participate in Committee Meetings and Informal Gatherings when a matter is to be considered/discussed in confidence if a member is attending a meeting electronically or over the telephone.

Additionally, the reviewed Code of Practice will allow community members to ask a question during an Ordinary Council Meeting rather than submitting a request to the CEO prior to an Ordinary Council Meeting.

The new Code of Practice Policy is based on the Local Government Association's model Code of Practice Policy, which makes Committee Meetings and Informal Gatherings more accessible to Council Members during confidential matters, as well as Ordinary Council Meetings more accessible to the public.

The existing Code of Practice has also had minor amendments of a grammatical nature and to ensure it complies with current legislation and internal policies.

At the January Ordinary Meeting of Council, Council Members endorsed the draft Code of Practice for consultation. The full Council report can be viewed on the <u>Town of Walkerville</u> <u>website</u>.
