

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
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Come along to the community safety forum

Let's reminisce: Captain Matthew Flinders' niece buried in Walkerville

In the Walkerville Wesleyan Cemetery on Smith Street, there is a headstone stating that Susanna Pilgrim was a 'niece of Captain Matthew Flinders'.

Captain Matthew Flinders was famously known for being a British navigator and cartographer who led the first inshore circumnavigation of mainland Australia – which was called New Holland at the time. He also popularised the name, 'Australia', in his book, Voyage to Terra Australis.

Five other members of the Pilgrim family are also buried in the same plot.

It raises the question, had she ever thought of the significance of living in the land discovered by her uncle?

Susanna Pearson was born in Boston, Lincolnshire, England to parents George Pearson and Susanna (Matthew Flinders' sister).

In 1837, Susanna married John Pilgrim, "a watercolour painter of some distinction". In 1849, the Pilgrim family migrated to SA aboard the *Boliver*, arriving in the early days of the colony in 1850.

They had a letter of commendation from their church at Wattisham, Suffolk, and became founding members of the Congregational Church in North Adelaide.

They settled down and lived the rest of their lives in Kermode Street, North Adelaide, with their two children. In 1873, her death was noted in the newspaper (*The Advertiser*, 18 Dec 1873). Her burial adds to the history of the Wesleyan Cemetery and early local settler society.

This throwback is part of the Town of Walkerville's monthly history series, touching on iconic and famous moments, people and places in Walkerville history. The history was researched and collected with assistance from local historian, Lyn O'Grady.

Walkerville steps up for birthing kit assembly day

The Rotary Club of Walkerville held a birthing kit assembly day on Sunday, with 40 volunteers putting their hand up to assist with creating birthing kits, which will be distributed to mothers in countries around the world, including Africa, Asia, the Pacific and the Caribbean.

This year's birthing kit assembly day was another great success, with volunteers putting together 800 birth kits – matching last year's birthing kit drive.

Expectant mothers living overseas will receive these important supplies that will help them have a sanitary birth. As supplies and medical support can be limited in developing countries, resources from the birthing kits can help reduce infection. The finished kits will be sent to Birthing Kits Foundation Australia and distributed overseas.

New data shows extent of Adelaide's tree canopy

About 17% of metropolitan Adelaide is covered in tree canopy, according to data released this week by urban environmental organization - Green Adelaide.

The study, led by Green Adelaide, is the first time State that and Local Government have partnered to capture tree canopy data for the entire metropolitan Adelaide area in a single study to provide a regionally consistent dataset and a full picture of tree canopy levels.

Town of Walkerville is above the Metropolitan average (of 16.7%) for tree canopy cover, sitting at 22.6%.

Green Adelaide Presiding Member. Professor Chris Daniels, said that this new data gives an indication of the current state Adelaide's urban forest and will help prioritise practical urban greening action.

"Adelaide is still a long way off of achieving 30% tree canopy cover, which is the widely accepted target for urban areas," said Professor Daniels.




Figure 1Tree canopy cover across Adelaide.

The data was captured via LiDAR technology, and shows an increase in tree canopy of nearly 4% compared to a similar survey in 2018 and 2019.

"The data shows that, compared to 2018 and 2019, our existing mature trees have gotten bigger and the trees planted over the past few years have now grown to three metres or more in height, meaning they are considered especially 'valuable' tree canopy," he said.

"They are considered valuable at this height because this is when they begin to provide shading and cooling benefits to the surrounding area."

Professor Daniels said that while tree growth was seen along local streets and in parks around metropolitan Adelaide, the data also shows tree removals in residential areas, where there is a high demand for land for housing, and along some major arterial roads that have undergone infrastructure upgrades.

"It is certainly interesting to see how this data compares to similar data captured in 2018/19, but until we survey across metropolitan Adelaide again in one to two years' time, it is too soon to determine whether it signifies an upward trend," he said.

"This has been a fantastic collaboration with all of Adelaide's metropolitan councils, and it gives us a single point of truth to guide our greening initiatives, particularly the State's first ever Urban Greening Strategy, which is soon to be released for public consultation."

The 2022 tree canopy data capture is a partnership between Green Adelaide, other State Government agencies and 18 councils across Adelaide to map tree canopy, green cover, built environment and urban heat islands.

Fast facts:

- 17% of metropolitan Adelaide is covered in tree canopy;
- minor 4% increase in tree canopy across metropolitan Adelaide compared to a similar data capture in 2018/19;
- impermeable surfaces, like roads, buildings and other hard surfaces, cover 29% of metropolitan Adelaide; and
- permeable surfaces, like bare earth, grassed areas and vegetation make up 67% (about 3.5% of the study area was water).
