## Message from the Mayor of Walkerville

### INDIVIDUALS MAKE THE COMMUNITY

Last month I launched a series of historical markers produced by Council in collaboration with the Walkerville Historical Society. These new historical markers have been installed at the following locations: Memorial Gardens, Belt, Crawford, Hawker, Thiele and Webster Reserves.

**Open spaces are integral to the character of the Township and are considered a vital community asset by our residents.**

95% of people who responded to our 2017 Town wide survey rated the visual presentation of the Township (i.e. tidy streets, lots of trees, etc.) as the issue that mattered most to them. Having access to a range of public open spaces such as parks, gardens and playgrounds was given the highest rating by 94% of people surveyed. Yet so many people drive or walk past our local reserves and gardens unaware of the fascinating and influential individuals they were named after. The impetus behind these historical markers was to give locals and visitors – and children and young people in particular – an insight into the lives of

individuals who played their part in the journey from settlement village to metropolitan Town. In realising this project, thanks go to Lyn O' Grady, the president of the Walkerville Historical Society. Council was proud to initiate and collaborate on this project. After all, a vibrant local culture inspired by diversity and inclusivity is one of our key strategic focus areas and this means ensuring our local histories and stories are recognised, recorded and accessible to current and future generations.

When I first took on the role of Mayor in 2014, I compared it to being the Chairman of a Board with residents as its shareholders. Having come from the corporate sector, the ethos of teamwork and individual commitment has shaped my world-view. In many ways, our community is like a team – albeit a team of almost 8000 people! We have leaders and entrepreneurs as well as committed individuals who work towards a common goal and embrace the spirit of teamwork.

Council recognises some of these committed individuals through its annual volunteer awards

and the 2017 recipients are featured in this issue. Volunteers are active at every level of our community. In recognising their efforts, we also shine a light on the many people whose lives and wellbeing are enriched through the services they provide.

The wellbeing of our community is not something Elected Members think about in abstract terms. Last year, we endorsed *Living Walkerville: wellbeing for every age and stage*, Council's first strategic document to focus on the wellbeing of its community.

This has led to the establishment of a new Committee of Council called the Women of Walkerville (WOW) Foundation. The Foundation seeks to champion the aspirations outlined in Council's wellbeing strategy. I am certain that the individual commitment of those involved and their combined knowledge, experience and passion for this community will achieve great outcomes.

In the lead up to the 2017 SALA Festival, we invited clients from the ECH day program and students from Vale Park Primary School to take part in a series of workshops and develop an arts project called *Visibility*.

Working under the guidance of community artist in residence Koruna Schmidt-Mumm, two groups, at opposite ends of the generational spectrum, worked as one team to create a multi-media, arts installation which will remain

on semi-permanent display in the Civic and Community Centre [see page 5]. The definition of visibility – 'is the state of being able to see or be seen'. Sadly, it's true that older people can feel they have become invisible – 'out of sight, out of mind'.

Rena Pascoe celebrated her 96th birthday this year and hopes to be volunteering when she celebrates her 100th. A World War Two RAAF Veteran, Rena is still very active in the community. Her journey as a volunteer, began when she was 15 years old, helping returned soldiers from World War One, who were facing personal and economic hardship. From that beginning, she has continued to volunteer with a range of different organisations. She has volunteered with the RSL and the Vietnam Veterans Association for the last 17 years.

#### **Community event of the year: World War One Memorial, dedication ceremony, Gilberton Amateur Swimming Club.**

In 2015, the Gilberton Amateur Swimming Club celebrated its centenary year and published a nostalgic tribute to its hey-day in a publication called *Meet you at the Gilby!* What emerged from this historical research was the important role the Club played in raising funds and supporting service men and women during

World War One. To acknowledge this chapter in their history, the Club, installed a Soldiers Memorial near the site of the original Club rooms. The memorial was unveiled during a dedication ceremony on 24th February 2017 hosted by the Club and the Walkerville RSL.

In 2013, Kathy and John Monks introduced weekly IT tutorials and monthly workshops on computers and IT devices. These have proved extremely popular and are now part of the library's ongoing programming. John and Kathy provide an important free service to the community and a friendly, welcoming space to ask questions and to learn new skills. Friendly, patient and always willing to go that extra mile – they are the first ever recipients of the Mayor's choice award.

This is a new Committee of Council comprising female elected members of the Town of Walkerville. 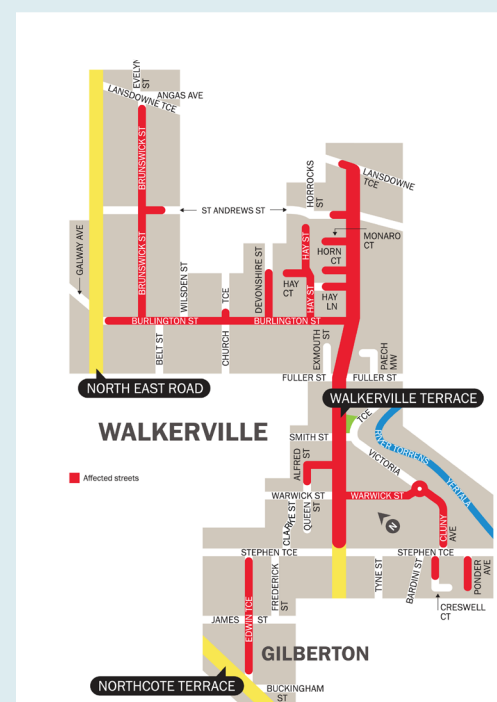

# Notification of gas works in the Town of Walkerville

Australian Gas Networks Ltd and the APA Group (APA) have written to residents to advise that they are replacing old, high maintenance gas mains in this area. The work is expected to be completed between the end of December 2017 to mid January 2018. Works include installation of a new pipeline and backfill and reinstatement of footpaths and roads. The gas mains upgrade will ensure more reliable gas supplies and reduce the possibilities of leaks. APA has contracted the works to DIONA who will be onsite most days between 7am and 5 pm weekdays.

To undertake this project, workers will need to access properties and gas meters and they will notify householders in advance when their gas supply will be turned off. This is a significant infrastructure project and residents and businesses may experience some noise and disruption from temporary traffic and access restrictions. Regular street clean-up and traffic management will be deployed to minimise disruption.

# Paws for thought: Dog and cat laws are changing



These changes are designed to improve dog and cat management and welfare, and are the result of years of planning and public consultation by the Dog and Cat Management Board and the State Government. Below is a summary of the changes that all dog and cat owners should be aware of.

## Compulsory desexing

From 1 July 2018 all new generations of dogs and cats (born after 1 July 2018) must be desexed by a certain age (unless exempted under the Act or if it is an existing dog born before 1 July 2018).



## Compulsory microchipping

From 1 July 2018, it will be compulsory for all dogs and cats to be microchipped. This applies to all existing dogs and cats.



## Discount microchipping

Microchipping is a safe and permanent way to identify your dog and cat. The procedure is quick, with no ongoing discomfort and can only be carried out by a trained, authorised implanter. Discount microchipping days are offered throughout the State at various times of the year.

## Dog and cat laws - penalties

Doing the right thing will not only make you a responsible pet owner, but also help avoid the new and increased penalties:

**Not registering your dog:**  
penalty \$170 (previously \$80)

**Dog attack:**  
penalty \$315 (previously \$210)

**Wandering at large:**  
penalty \$210 (previously \$80)

**Failing to microchip:**  
From 1 July 2018 - penalty \$170

**Failing to desex:**  
From 1 July 2018 - penalty \$170

## Changes to dog registration

Categories: Dog registration in South Australia is being simplified by reducing the dog registration categories and rebates. Walkerville Council has reviewed its current categories and rebates for the 2018/19 period.

The new categories as determined by the Act are:

- **Standard dog:** A dog that is both desexed and microchipped.
- **Non-standard dog:** All other dogs, even if they are exempt from rules around desexing or microchipping.

This may mean that your registration for 2018/19 will have your dog placed into one of these categories (additional rebates may apply).

Following the first round of consultation undertaken in October 2016, Walkerville Council reviewed all the feedback and comments received and refined the *Movement management plan 2017 - 2020* for the next phase of community consultation.
