# FROM THE ACTING CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

American author Simon Sinek once said: "Leadership is about empowering others to achieve things they did not think possible."

As I reflect on my time at the Town of Walkerville in various positions across the past four years, I cannot think of a more fitting synopsis for the leadership style of Kiki Cristol. From pushing the boundaries of Local Government in order to facilitate new methods of engagement, to inspiring her employees to think outside of the box when delivering projects and working with the community – Ms Cristol is truly one to admire. She would articulate a vision of the local environment that did not yet exist and then ask her team for help to ensure the vision came to life. Her impact can be seen all around the Township – from the John Cleeve "Ministry of Silly Walks" COVID corflutes and the "Don't be a turd, scoop the poop" signage throughout the district, to the flagship

design of the Civic and Community Centre and rolling out the use of QR codes through marketing material and the Streets of Distinction sign blades.

There has been no task or idea too big to investigate, which is a great feat for the smallest Council in metropolitan Adelaide. Ms Cristol's style of management as Town of Walkerville CEO for more than 13 years, was one heavily focussed on equality and equity. I would like to take this opportunity, on behalf of my fellow staff members and the Town of Walkerville Council, to thank Ms Cristol for her service and the invaluable legacy she has left on the area. We wish her all the very best as she moves onto a new adventure to retirement.

Whilst looking back, I would also like to acknowledge the work that has been accomplished this year. From the completion of the Hamilton Reserve Rejuvenation Project and implementation of inclusive infrastructure in our reserves, to embarking on the redevelopment of

Walkerville Oval facilities and refurbishment of 39 Smith Street – the decisions made over the course of the past 12 months are some that will influence the Township for decades to come.

We were granted \$5 million for the 39 Smith Street site, more than \$130,000 to upgrade Alfred Street into a green avenue with improved stormwater management, and we completed a \$140,000 redevelopment of Crawford Reserve to meet community needs – including a very popular red telephone box book library. In addition, three disability compliant Exeloo toilet blocks were installed at high-usage parks – Willow Bend Reserve, Levi Park

and Hamilton Reserve – and disability-friendly park furniture and barbecue facilities were installed at Hamilton Reserve. Other major outdoor successes included the completion of a 100m-long nature-inspired mural along Ascot Avenue, in partnership with Senman Creations and Vale Park Primary students, and resurfacing all Council-owned tennis courts in order to bring the facilities up to current playing standards.

While we were working on this edition of *About Town*, the 2022 Local Government election process was still in progress – and was expected to be completed by the delivery of this newsletter. The results will be published on Council's website and

# COUNCIL NEWS

## Walkerville Oval redevelopment

Council most recently consulted on a revised design for the Warwick Street (sports club) building, as part of the Walkerville Oval redevelopment – which included a balcony with tiered seating and was costed at \$10.1 million.

Consultation was undertaken from 9am on 27 July 2022 to 5pm on 24 August 2022. A total of 289 respondents completed the survey.

### Consultation snapshot:

- 51% ratepayers, 49% non-ratepayers.
- 58% Walkerville Sports Club members, 42% non-members.
- Overall, 86% of all respondents are supportive of the Walkerville Oval redevelopment project proceeding, which is an increase on the 75% of respondents who said they wanted an upgrade to take place during the last consultation.

- 82% of ratepayers are supportive of the Walkerville Oval redevelopment project proceeding (compared with 91% of non-ratepayers supporting the project proceeding).
- Club members are most supportive of the Walkerville Oval redevelopment, with 92% wanting the project to proceed (compared with 78% of non-members).

- Key reasons for support of the redevelopment proceeding include, improving the sport facilities and upgrading a community asset.
- Two-thirds of all respondents (68%) are supportive of the Smith Street (bowling club) design. This is slightly lower for ratepayers (66%) and slightly higher for non-ratepayers (70%).

- Key reasons for support of the Smith Street (bowling club) include the good/functional proposed design, improving the current facilities and creating a fit-for-purpose building.

**Next steps:**  
 An open tender process, seeking project costings, will be undertaken for the remainder of 2022, with findings expected to be presented and workshopped with Council in January 2023.

Council acknowledges the State Government for its contribution of \$4 million as part of the Local Government Infrastructure Partnership Program.



## Vale Park suburb realignment

There will be no change to the boundaries of Vale Park and Walkerville, following a decision by Council at its 17 October 2022 ordinary meeting.

Elected Members had been considering the potential realignment and renaming of the suburbs after a Motion without Notice by Cr MaryLou Bishop in December 2020,

to gauge whether there was community interest in creating clearer boundary lines by delineating the two suburbs by Ascot Avenue.

In October 2022, Council resolved to abandon the proposed suburban boundary realignment, based on the findings from the August 2022 community consultation, which showed:

- 931 respondents (839 of which were ratepayers) completed the survey.
- A total of 63% of respondents opposed any such boundary realignment.

The Office of the Surveyor-General previously indicated that at least 75-80% of respondents must be in favour of any such change in order to proceed. Therefore, the boundaries of both Walkerville and Vale Park will remain as they currently exist.

## 39 Smith Street

A community garden, play equipment and open space were the top three community preferences for the land adjacent to 39 Smith Street. As part of a public consultation process – undertaken from 9am on Monday 29 August 2022 until 5pm on Friday 23 September 2022 – Council informed the community of the current plans and timeframes for the refurbishment and activation of 39 Smith Street, as well as sought general feedback about possible future options for the activation of the



old Fuller Street works depot site. A total of 47 survey submissions were received and the order of popularity for use of the site was:

1. Community garden
2. Play equipment
3. Open space
4. Dog park
5. Other
6. Skate park
7. Car park.

Of those who selected "other", top responses included netball or basketball courts, space catering for teenagers and a café. The results can be found on Council's website.

Preliminary concepts have been designed based on the community feedback (pictured above). The community will be further consulted on the design, prior to any decisions, and the project will be workshopped with Council in January 2023.

With Christmas just around the corner, here are some great ways you can avoid, reduce, re-use, recycle and compost waste, which can save you time and money too!



Avoid buying an advent calendar filled with excess packaging of individually wrapped chocolates and adopt a **reverse advent calendar** instead. Each day in the month leading up to Christmas, add an item to a box, such as food, toiletries and good quality toys. Try to get plastic free items with recyclable packaging. On Christmas Eve, donate the box to a charity.



Rather than getting everyone a present, just **be present**. The time you spend with family and friends is much more valuable! Embrace the **Kris Kringle** method and purchase one good gift per person, rather than lots of gifts for everyone. This will save you time, money and waste.



Why not make your own decorations using re-used Christmas paper and cards, cardboard or **natural materials**, such as pinecones and gumnuts? This is also a great holiday activity for children.



Christmas wrapping **paper only** – no cellophane or plastic wrapping please! If you can't rip it, you can't recycle it in the yellow recycle bin. Cellophane can be recycled in the REDCycle bins found at Coles and Woolworths. Make sure all containers are **empty and rinsed** before placing them in the recycle bin. **Place items in loose** and not in a plastic bag. Bagged recycling can't be sorted and goes to waste!



Place **all food scraps** including meat, seafood, bones, dairy, unwanted leftovers and spoiled food in your green lidded food and garden organics bin. **TIP:** To avoid the smells from seafood and food scraps in the bin, wrap them in newspaper and store in the freezer until the night before your bin collection. Place a reminder on your fridge or bin so you don't forget to pop them in the green bin.

It features reminder notifications the night before collection.

# Works about Town



## Crawford Reserve

The books were stacked at the telephone box street library, the lawns were mowed and the uplighting was ready to go for the unveiling of the Crawford Reserve upgrade. The final touches were put on the Walkerville Terrace park as it was officially opened to the community in October 2022. The revamped open space includes a picnic table, telephone box book library, reading nook shelter, a barbecue, additional bench seating, an irrigation system upgrade to increase efficiency and disability-friendly paths.

## Alfred Street: road and streetscape upgrade

Works to transform Alfred Street into a green "avenue" connecting Walkerville Terrace to the oval precinct are underway.

The project aims to create a more inviting streetscape with roadside trees and plantings, improved stormwater management and a safer environment for pedestrians. It includes turning Alfred Street into a one-way avenue (entrance from Walkerville Terrace and exit via Warwick Street) to assist with parking and vehicle access, as well as to create a safer walking space for pedestrians. In addition, extra trees will be planted, along with new raingardens and irrigated garden beds.



The purpose of the changes to Alfred Street is to address community feedback, which identified key concerns with pedestrian and access issues, lack of proper footpaths, stormwater problems and the poor condition of the road. The upgrade is expected to be completed in January 2023.

*Council acknowledges the State Government for its contribution of \$131,087.50 towards the project as part of the 2021/22 Greener Neighbourhoods Grants Program.*

## Forestreet

The Town of Walkerville views trees as significant community assets – like roads or buildings – and it is important that Council has accurate data to make informed tree management decisions.

To assist in this process, Council's outdoor team members use tree management software Forestreet when out in the field undertaking tree maintenance and assessments. This software helps staff undertake proactive maintenance, plan planting programs and undertake detailed tree audit reports.

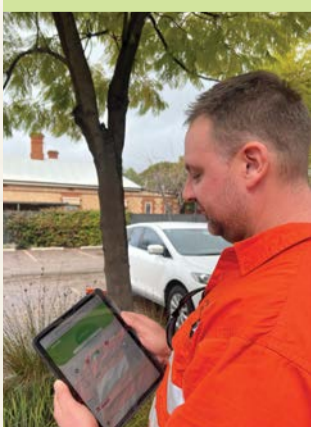


Trees are mapped geospatially and staff simply log onto the Forestreet website using their iPad or mobile device and select the tree they are working on.

Independent audits are also undertaken on the Township's trees every five years to ensure Forestreet has the most up to date details to go along with the information collected in Council's day-to-day operations.

The program assists in keeping Council's tree canopy healthy. The Town of Walkerville urban forest (public and private land) covers approximately 25% of the Township and there are approximately 28 different species, which account for more than 4,000 street trees in the area.

This year, more than 100 street trees were planted across the Township.

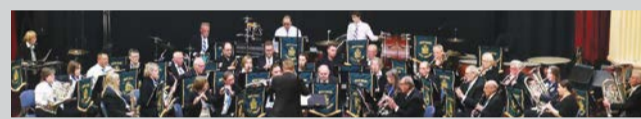


## Pleasant Sunday Afternoon Concert

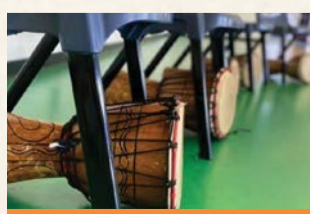
