During the Citizenship Ceremony, Mayor Melissa Jones said that the Town of Walkerville was a thriving multicultural Township and she was pleased to have the new citizens officially join our close-knit community.

"As we contemplate Refugee Week, as we contemplate a world in which there are many people forcibly displaced from their home countries, it is our duty to reflect and appreciate the importance of not only finding our own freedom, but helping others find theirs," Mayor Jones said.

Following the Pledge of Commitment from each new Australian at the ceremony, opera singer Jeremy Tatchell performed the Australian National Anthem.

All new citizens received a special gift bag welcoming them as new citizens to the community. This gift bag included a plant from the Rotary Club of Walkerville, as well as a special handwritten letter from Vale Park Primary School Year two and three students, which welcomed the conferees as Australian citizens to the community.

Mayor Jones said to the new citizens, "As Mayor, there is no greater privilege than to attend a Citizenship Ceremony to see what it means for people whose journey to citizenship does not begin with being born in this country and particularly those whose journey here begins in difficult circumstances.

"Walkerville is like a Village. Walkervillians embrace and thrive on our community. I encourage you to get involved in everything on offer in Walkerville."





### **Results of the Township-wide Community Survey**


The Town of Walkerville is outperforming other councils in overall community satisfaction, along with a range of other areas such as customer service, parks and consultation.

The positive results follow a six-week engagement process earlier this year as part of Council's 2023 Community Survey.

The aim of the survey is to gauge the community's perspectives on various significant areas within Council – such as health and wellness, parks and reserves, roads and infrastructure, and communication and engagement.

The survey measures how the community currently feels about Council's delivery of services and their satisfaction with those services, along with an evaluation of performance and operations.

The results of the survey were largely positive, with 382 residents participating in the consultation. The outcome of the survey showcases the strengths of the Council and highlights some areas of improvement.





Key points from the 2023 Community Survey results include:

- 59% overall satisfaction rating for Council.
- Higher satisfaction rating at 3.5 (out of 5), compared to benchmarked surrounding councils (average satisfaction rating of 3.3 out of 5).
- Between 65-69% of people who contacted Council's customer service team were satisfied with their experience.
- 77% of the community perceive the Town of Walkerville as a safe and secure place
- Council outperformed other Adelaide councils in multiple satisfaction categories, including:
  - o Stormwater management
  - Ovals and sporting facilities
  - Parks, reserves and playgrounds
  - o Customer service
  - Community engagement and consultation
  - Heritage management.
- The top five services for community satisfaction are waste management, the Town's visual presentation, Walkerville library and the range of open public spaces, playgrounds and parks.



• The most observed communication received by residents, About Town at 94%, had the highest satisfaction rating out of any other Council communication option, sitting at 74%.

Also highlighted in the survey was the community's feedback around the future of Town of Walkerville, including traffic and parking. These concerns have been captured within Council's recent Transport Strategy engagement process, which will be addressed in 2023/24 as part of a local transport action plan.



In addition, the community revealed a desire for more outdoor events, including street events (58%), outdoor cinema sessions (49%), community picnics (43%), art events (37%) and large outdoor children's events (25%). Council has taken this feedback on board and allocated \$50,000 in the <u>Draft 2023/24 Annual Business Plan</u> for local community events. In addition, the new Walkerville Community Committee also plans to assist in this space by creating low-cost events that foster a sense of inclusion amongst all residents.

Market research company McGregor Tan undertook the Community Survey engagement process, which was open from 9am on Tuesday 14 March 2023 until 5pm on Friday 21 April 2023.

## **Results of the Transport Strategy Survey**

The Town of Walkerville has received the results of its 2023 Transport Strategy Survey, following an extensive engagement process with the community.



There were 668 community members – including residents, commuters and visitors – who provided their feedback on concerns, issues and improvements needed for traffic and transport within the Council area.

Highlights from the Transport Strategy Survey include:

- 68% of respondents use a private car to get to work or school in the Township.
- The most important issues for the community are pedestrian safety, footpaths, traffic volumes and speeding in local residential streets.
- Participants are supportive of Council investigating 40km/h roads in eligible precincts within the Township.

Respondents identified a number of key items for action within the future, including:

- Slower speeds through residential streets.
- Pedestrian safety initiatives along Walkerville Terrace.
- Better management of traffic around schools.
- Improvements to safer walking, cycling and public transport access along Council boundaries.

The survey results will be used to form a local action plan, which is earmarked for the 2023/24 financial year as part of the <u>Draft Annual Business Plan</u>.





## Have your say on the Draft 2023/24 Annual Business Plan

Council's Draft 2023/24 Annual Business Plan has been developed to deliver services, facilities and programs that support our community and businesses over the next financial year.

As part of the planning process, the Town of Walkerville community is invited to provide feedback on the draft plan for 2023/24.

The Draft 2023/24 Annual Business Plan will be funded by a proposed average residential rate increase of 6.9% (excluding growth), which is below the rate of inflation over the past 12 months and at the lower end of the projected rate rises in Councils across South Australia.



This Annual Business Plan will continue Council's excellent maintenance of parks and gardens, progress our road and footpath renewal program, create new event and activity opportunities with the Township, and continue public consultation on important projects, policies, and initiatives.

At a Special Council Meeting on Monday, 5 June 2023, Elected Members endorsed the Draft Annual Business Plan for consultation. The full Council report can be viewed on the <u>Council website</u>.



The consultation for the Annual Business Plan opened at 9am on Thursday, 8 June 2023, and closes at 5pm on Friday, 7 July 2023.

#### Asset Management Plan

(Page 28 and 29 of the Draft 2023/24 Annual Business Plan)

The majority of funding across each asset class for Council-owned infrastructure remains steady across the 10-year funding program to maintain current service levels, with the following exceptions:

- Roads 2025-2028 Roads renewal funding slightly increases over these years to compensate for a reduction in the roads program in 2022-2024 to assist with funding of major strategic projects. This funding increase will help get Council road renewal back to the current service standard provided to the Township and allow the program to return to a more consistent funding model from 2028-2029.
- Plant and Equipment 2023-2025 There is an increase in funding over two financial years as two major pieces of plant have reached their end of useful life in those years.
- Buildings 2024-2026 There is a significant increase in funding over these two financial years due to anticipated additional work required in relation to the Walkerville Oval redevelopment and 39 Smith Street refurbishment, which is not covered by the relevant grant funding.
