FROM THE MAYOR OF WALKERVILLE

A few weeks ago, I took part in a history-making photoshoot. *The Advertiser* had invited all the new female mayors from metropolitan Adelaide to appear on their front page (*Thursday 15 November 2018*). Ten Councils in metropolitan Adelaide now have a female Mayor – an outcome that is definitely newsworthy!

As a mother of two teenage daughters, I can't deny this was a significant moment for me. As the new Mayor of the Town of Walkerville, I was also incredibly proud to say that, so far, I am the fourth female Mayor elected to represent our Community.

Diversity and balance are the key elements for an Elected Member body. It is vitally important that the people who are making the decisions also reflect, and can connect, with the daily challenges and values of the community they have been elected to represent.

I believe we have a truly representative Elected Member body for our community. This new Council has two returning Councillors who have the experience and context, combined with new voices and points of view from people who are new to Council.



I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge my fellow Councillors: Robert Ashby, MaryLou Bishop (returning), Norm Coleman, Stephen Furlan, Jennifer Joshi, James Nenke, Conrad Wilkins and James Williams (returning).

As the new Mayor, I am committed to maintaining the financial stability established by the previous

Council as well as to upholding the principles defined in our *2016 – 2020 Strategic Community plan* - ensuring that our decisions are shaped by the interests and values of the community; respecting our history; and providing services that are equitable, responsible and sustainable.

However, we live in ever changing times and we will

need to adapt in a resilient and responsible way. My priority is to address the changing demographic of our Council area. The last two censuses have shown that our median age has changed from mid-60s to mid-40s. This is quite a dramatic shift.

Inclusivity and safety are another priority for me. One of my first engagements as Mayor was to address the Walkerville Neighbourhood Watch meeting. Council has no authority to intervene in Police matters or criminal activities, nor does it decide who lives here. While our influence in this arena is limited, it does not mean we aren't listening.

The previous Council had already started a dialogue with SAPOL and Housing SA. This is set to continue as it provides a valuable opportunity to share the concerns of our residents and get a balanced view of what is happening. In response, SAPOL have

introduced Eastern District Neighbourhood Teams, including a dedicated SAPOL Officer for the Township. Incidentally, Norwood Police Station has also extended its opening hours (refer page 3).

At the official Swearing-in ceremony which was held on the 19 November 2018, I advised the Elected Members that the *Council Chamber* is the place to debate, to discuss, to collaborate and to contribute. I noted that we would not always agree, but that we should always strive to find common ground and to respect and welcome our different points of view. This will be my mantra in my role as Mayor.

In closing, I wish you and your loved ones a Happy and safe Christmas and New Year.

Question time

Ordinary meetings of Council are held on the third Monday of every month and start at 7pm Monday night.

When a Council meeting coincides with a public holiday, the meeting is held the following Tuesday.

Agendas containing all the reports to be discussed in the Chamber are posted on Council's website prior to the meeting. Minutes documenting decisions of Council are available online shortly afterwards.

Members of the public are always welcome to attend Council meetings and sit in the gallery as observers. There is also an opportunity for people to participate more directly in the meeting by asking questions of the Council.

How to ask a question in Council meetings:

- Put your question in writing (email is fine) to the attention of the

Chief Executive Officer, prior to the 7pm start of the meeting.

- You (or a proxy) will need to attend the meeting to ask your question in person.
- There is a limit of two questions and two minutes per question.
- We suggest keeping your questions to the point and avoiding long-winded statements.
- Question time (including responses) is limited to 30 minutes.

There is an established framework to how Council meetings are run so that they are orderly and productive. This framework ensures meetings do not become a 'free for all' for people to come in and ask questions on a range of topics and distract from matters of business set out in the agenda.

There are also practical reasons for having some

ground rules around question time. A time-limit means that meetings can be run efficiently so that all the items in the agenda can be dealt with. There are no tactical advantages in submitting questions at the last minute. In fact, the more notice you provide Administration, the better it can provide you with an informed response – particularly when your question requires research and consultation with Council staff.

In some instances, questions can be answered and resolved prior to the meeting, so it is in everyone's interest to put questions in early.

Works about Town

Below is a summary of works about town as well as updates on recently completed projects. Where required, Council communicates directly with residents in affected streets and areas. For more information subscribe to Council's weekly online newsletter *The weekly roundup* (via the 'contact us' section on our homepage).

Landsdowne Terrace works and stormwater upgrade, Vale Park.

Work is on schedule to be completed in March 2019. Contractors will be taking a short break during the Christmas period prior to commencing work at Ascot Avenue and Evelyn Street from 3 January 2019. New infrastructure will be constructed to divert storm water flows from Ascot Avenue into the new Lansdowne storm water system.

Linear Park - Stage 3 LED lighting upgrade

The first two stages of the LED lighting upgrade along Linear Park have been completed. Stage 3 commences before Christmas. New lamposts and energy efficient LED lights will be installed between the Ascot Avenue bridge (town boundary) and the Creswell Reserve (from the lower level bridge at Creswell) through to Stephen Terrace.

No closures are anticipated.

Temporary closure Gilberton Boardwalk

Residents are advised that Gilberton Boardwalk will be closed for a few weeks. During the closure a new handrail and non-slip walking surface will be installed in preparation for the winter months. On-site signage will be in place with detour options. At the time of going to print closure dates were not confirmed but work is expected to occur in December/January.



Vale Barrie Redman OAM tribute to a local volunteer

Barrie Redman passed away peacefully in September 2018, months after his 80th birthday.

A founding member of the Walkerville Neighbourhood Watch (circa 1980s), Barrie was involved with the organisation for several decades. He was a former Treasurer and editor of the Walkerville Neighbourhood Watch newsletter and the coordinator of one of its geographical sub-groups.

For some 15 years, he was also the desktop publisher of the Walkerville Historical Society's newsletter and, in order to preserve important records for historical research, digitalised various documents held by Council.

He also served as Secretary and Treasurer of the Friends of the Walkerville Library. Some may remember Barrie playing the piano at Council's Australia Day Citizenship Ceremonies, whilst others may recall his regular and often forthright letters to *The Advertiser* on a range of social and political topics.

In 2002, Barrie was awarded an OAM for 'services to the community of Walkerville, particularly through the preservation and promotion of local history'.

Local resident and waste warrior Karen Murphy shares her ideas on how to fill the holiday season with thoughtful gifts, delicious food and memory making. It's the perfect gift for Planet Earth!

- I love the giving of experiences and there are vouchers and memberships you can buy that suit every age and taste such as beauty and wellbeing vouchers, theatre tickets or movie passes.

- When it comes to buying gifts, consider supporting a local producer or buying a unique handmade item from a local market or school fete.

- These days it's easier than ever to source zero waste gifts like stylish coffee cups and drink bottles or grab re-usable silicone straws and recycled paper pencils for Xmas stockings.

- In my family, we play a Kris Kringle game. This year, the rule is that all gifts must be purchased from an op shop.

- To decorate our table, I have made fabric bonbons. I think bonbons are one of the most wasteful Christmas purchases, with their excessive packaging and cheap contents that typically end up in landfill. 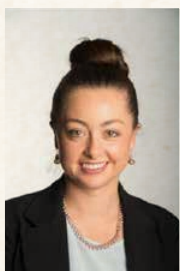

The healthy Xmas table

**When it comes to a safe
and healthy Xmas, a
meat thermometer can
be a cook's best friend.
Below are some handy**

**hints from the Eastern
Health Authority to
ensure that the only
thing you'll take away
from the table this
Christmas are happy
memories!**

- Wash your hands in
warm soapy water
before preparing and
cooking food, and after
handling eggs, raw meat,
particularly poultry,
burgers and sausages.
- Take the guess work
out of the equation
by investing in a meat
thermometer. You'll
know when your turkey
is cooked when it has
reached 75° C in the
thickest part of the thigh.
- Avoid overstocking
the fridge as this can
affect the temperature.
Listeria can grow at
refrigeration
temperatures, so
ready-to-eat food or
leftovers should never
be stored in the fridge
for more than 24 hours.
Handy hint: Create
room in your fridge on
Xmas Day by stocking
drinks on ice in your
laundry or elsewhere.
- Beware of cross-
contamination which
can occur when raw
food is placed in direct
contact with ready to
eat foods, or if raw
meat juices drip onto
cooked foods, fruit and
other ready to eat food.
- Christmas ham won't
last forever – check the
storage instructions
and best before or
use by date. Before

removing the ham
from its plastic wrap,
cover it with a clean cloth
soaked in water and
vinegar so it doesn't dry
out, and store it in the
fridge below 5°C.

- Always reheat leftovers
to 75°C in the centre of
the item or the thickest
part to kill any food
poisoning bugs.
- Refrigerate leftovers
promptly and use
within 24 hours or
freeze.

How it all began... from 1838 to 2018



Imagine if you can, a delightful meandering river, gentle sloping land lightly covered with wattle, pines, peppermint and stately gums. This describes the section of land that Governor John Hindmarsh selected for subdivision into 100 allotments and sold at auction in 1838.

There was no shortage of buyers. Since 1836, settlers had been living in tents and shipping boxes in the parklands waiting for a chance to purchase smaller blocks. In 1838, prospective landowners met in August, October, and December to pay their instalments.

Captain John Walker represented a number of these landowners and presided over the December meeting as Treasurer.

Mr William Mann, a friend of Capt Walker gave this lively account of that fateful meeting:

"...my friend being the Treasurer, made a short speech on the object of the meeting, and commenced collecting, at the same time, calling for the money which had previously been subscribed.

A person with a strong provincial accent stated that the town was not named, [nor were] ... the streets and terraces.

Victoria Terrace was proposed, but opposed on the grounds that there was one of the squares in the city called after the Queen already, and they

would grant her no more honours in that way, "until they could see how she would turn out".

With the streets and terraces named, there came the important matter of naming the village itself. Although the Acting Governor, Mr Stephen was mentioned, he was not supported as strongly as he might have been a few weeks before as he was now out of office. The present Governor was next mentioned 'but as Colonel Gawler had only recently arrived, they wanted to see what kind of a Governor he would become, before they spoiled him by flattery.

It was at length proposed to call the township after the Treasurer whom they all respected, which being carried without opposition, three cheers were given for Walkerville and the party separated."

A year later, Capt. Walker presided over a meeting of "the inhabitants and proprietors of this rising village" of Walkerville. To celebrate Walkerville's first anniversary, a dinner was held on Sunday 25 November 1839 at Lawes' Tavern and Tea Gardens on the banks of the Torrens (where today's shopping centre and Mary P Harris Reserve are located).

Postscript: Luckily, Queen Victoria turned out quite well. Her reign ended in 1901, the second longest reign in British history. Alas, Captain Walker did not fare so well. He was imprisoned for debt in 1841 and eventually cut his losses and moved to Tasmania.
